
Psalm 92



Theme: Give Thanks!

Psalm 92:1-15

A Psalm. A Song for the Sabbath day.

¹ It is good to give thanks to the LORD, And to sing praises to Your name, O Most High;

² To declare Your lovingkindness in the morning, And Your faithfulness every night,

³ On an instrument of ten strings, On the lute, And on the harp, With harmonious sound.

⁴ For You, LORD, have made me glad through Your work; I will triumph in the works of Your hands.

⁵ O LORD, how great are Your works! Your thoughts are very deep.

⁶ A senseless man does not know, Nor does a fool understand this.

⁷ When the wicked spring up like grass, And when all the workers of iniquity flourish, *It is* that they may be destroyed forever.

⁸ But You, LORD, are on high forevermore.

⁹ For behold, Your enemies, O LORD, For behold, Your enemies shall perish; All the workers of iniquity shall be scattered.

¹⁰ But my horn You have exalted like a wild ox; I have been anointed with fresh oil.

¹¹ My eye also has seen *my desire* on my enemies; My ears hear *my desire* on the wicked Who rise up against me.

¹² The righteous shall flourish like a palm tree, He shall grow like a cedar in Lebanon.

¹³ Those who are planted in the house of the LORD Shall flourish in the courts of our God.

¹⁴ They shall still bear fruit in old age; They shall be fresh and flourishing,

¹⁵ To declare that the LORD is upright; *He is* my rock, and *there is* no unrighteousness in Him.

Introduction

Context: Psalm 91 dealt with safety and protection in a difficult time. Psalm 92 is a psalm of thanksgiving after being saved from this danger. This is the only psalm in the entire book dedicated to the Sabbath Day.

Consider

92:1–2. According to the psalmist, what is "good"? What does he "declare" as part of this praise?

When does he praise and worship?

Note: The word "lovingkindness" in 92:2 (the Hebrew word hesed, often translated "covenant love") means much more than showing kindness—it means the kind of love that makes and keeps promises.

"Faithfulness" means permanent or enduring; something you can count on.

92:3. How does the psalmist worship and give thanks to God?

92:4. According to this verse, why is it "good" to praise the Lord (92:1–2)? How has God made the psalmist "glad"? Why does the psalmist "triumph"?

92:5–9. Notice the contrasts in these verses:

The LORD has done what He purposed; He has fulfilled His word Which He commanded in days of old. He has thrown down and has not pitied, And He has caused an enemy to rejoice over you; He has exalted the horn of your adversaries.
